This course will examine the intersections of science, philosophy, and theology, with attention to three historical cases: (a) the Galileo affair, (b) controversies over Darwin and natural selection, and (c) contemporary debates [history in the making] over evolutionary psychology and the status of the soul as the marker of the imago Dei. In each part we will alternate detailed consideration of historical case studies with careful theological and philosophical analysis of key concepts and argumentative strategies. Along with the expectation of informed discussion, each student will be required to write three short papers (one for each topic) and a term paper.

#### Course Requirements:

#### Informed Discussion:

Since this course is a seminar, each student should come to each session prepared to raise questions about the readings and respond constructively to questions posed by other seminar participants.

#### Short Papers:

Each student will write three short papers (5 - 10 pages), one for each of the major divisions of the course. In the paper the student will pick a particular issue and analyze that theme, following it through the course readings. Besides accuracy of readings of texts, papers will be evaluated according to the students ability to take an interesting position on the theme that she or he chooses and to argue it persuasively in the course of the paper. While the theme can be predominantly philosophical or theological, given the integrative character of the course, a predominantly philosophical paper should at some point discuss the theological presuppositions or ramifications of the philosophical themes under consideration, while a predominantly theological paper must do the same with respect to theological issues.

## Term Paper

Å final term paper (15 - 20 pages in length) will be due on Monday, May 7 (of finals week). Students will meet with course instructors following Spring Break to discuss their topics.
