The paradox of the stone

Here is a very old paradox designed to show that an omnipotent being is impossible:

- 1. Either (i) God can create a stone so large that God cannot lift it or (ii) God cannot create a stone so large that God cannot lift it.
- 2. If (i), then there is something God cannot do (lift the stone).
- 3. If (ii), then there is something God cannot do (make the stone).
- 4. There is something God cannot do. (1,2,3)

C. God is not omnipotent. (4)

'the state of affairs of there being a rock so large that the creator of that rock cannot lift it'
