- 1. Explain the first cause argument for the existence of God. Should an agnostic be convinced by this argument that God exists?
- 2. Explain the cosmological argument for the existence of God. Should an agnostic be convinced by this argument that God exists?
- 3. Explain the Bayesian fine-tuning argument for the existence of God. Should an agnostic be convinced by this argument that God exists?
- 4. Explain the argument from the existence of some evil in the world. Should an agnostic be convinced by this argument that God does not exist?
- 5. Does the existence of free will explain why a perfectly good and omnipotent being would allow some evil to exist in the world? Why or why not?
- 6. Is there such a thing as natural evil (evil not caused by free actions) in the world? Should an agnostic be convinced by the existence of natural evil that God does not exist?
- 7. Should an agnostic be convinced by the argument from horrors that God does not exist?
- 8. What is the strongest argument in favor of your having free will? Is the argument convincing? Why or why not?
- 9. Is free will compatible with determinism? Why or why not?
- 10. Explain the fatalist argument against free will. Is the argument sound? Why or why not?
- 11. Explain the foreknowledge argument against free will. Is the argument sound? Why or why not?
- 12. Do Libet's experiments show that humans have, at best, a very limited kind of free will? Why or why not?
