

Deontology

Judge only in accordance with a universalizable rule


Treat persons only as ends in themselves, never as means

Always respect the autonomy of others.

Proper intention is crucial

Problems:

Not every contingency is covered by a rule? Limited role for emotion and affect?



Immanuel Kant (1724-1804)


Consequentialism

Judge only on the basis of consequences

Sum of happiness and suffering

Problems:

Whose happiness and suffering? Lack of objective metrics? Calculational intractability?

Virtue Ethics


Ask first about moral character, not acts

Character is a set of virtues, which are settled habits of action or dispositions to act, aiming at the promotion of the good life or human flourishing

Action modeled on moral exemplars

Problems:

Relative to context and culture? Explicit justification need not precede action?

The Capabilities Approach Inspired in Part by Virtue Ethics

Popular today in international development studies as an alternative to the kind of cost-benefit analysis inspired by consequentialism

Identify the capabilities necessary in a given context for full human flourishing

Identify the conditions - material, legal, etc. - necessary for the development and expression of these capabilities

Design interventions for the purpose of realizing or securing those conditions

Likewise with policy decisions in other arenas

Ethics of Care

We are all interdependent, not moral atoms

The most vulnerable require special moral consideration

Context is crucial, because not everyone has the same needs and interests

Problems:


