- 1. What, if anything, do Zeno's paradoxes show about space, time, and motion?
- 2. Singer defends two principles, each of which seems to entail that giving a substantial amount of money to alleviate third world poverty is morally obligatory. Distinguish the principles, and say whether you think either, both, or neither is true, and why. Discuss whether you think McGinn's examples are counterexamples to either of these principles, and why.
- 3. Explain the problem of moral luck. What do you think is the most plausible response to the problem? Why?
- 4. Is it rational to believe in God on the basis of Pascal's wager? Does Pascal's discussion provide evidence for the existence of God? Can it ever be rational to believe something without any evidence?
