- 1. Explain the consequence argument for the incompatibility of free will and determinism. Say what you think is the best compatibilist reply to that argument, and evaluate the reply.
- 2. Explain Frankfurt's theory of free will. What are some of the theory's strengths and weaknesses? Is it, in the end, plausible?
- 3. Why might one adopt an agent-causal theory of free will? Does agent-causation make sense? Give the best argument for the theory you can think of.
- 4. Explain and evaluate van Inwagen's central argument against agent-causal theories of free will.
- 5. Explain and evaluate van Inwagen's argument for the conclusion that we act freely on many fewer occasions than one might have thought.
- 6. Explain the basic argument for the incompatibility of free will and foreknowledge. What is the Ockhamist response? Is it plausible?
- 7. Explain Warfield's argument for the compatibility of free will and foreknowledge. Does it establish the compatibility of the two? If not, what does it establish?
- 8. How did Aquinas attempt to resolve free will and foreknowledge? Is the attempt successful? Consider what you take to be the strongest objection to Aquinas' view.
- 9. Explain the problem of moral luck, and say what you think is the best response to this problem.
