In your third paper, you should answer one of the following four questions:

1. What is the correct solution to the problem of the statue and the clay?
2. Which of the following is correct: (a) we have free will, and it is compatible with determinism; (b) we have free will, and it is incompatible with determinism; or (c) we have no free will?
3. Is moral realism, moral relativism, or moral nihilism true?
4. Is there such a thing as moral luck?

If you would like your TA to look at a rough draft for you, you must give them the draft a full week before the paper is due: so, by the end of the day on Tuesday, April 21.

Unlike previous papers, this one need not be divided into numbered sections. But, as with those papers, in this one you must accomplish a few different things:

- (i) Say what you think the correct answer to your question is.
- (ii) State what is in your view the strongest argument or arguments in favor of your answer to the question.
- (iii) State the two or more objections to your answer which you think are the most challenging.
- (iv) Give what you think is the best response to each of these two objections.
- (v) Explain why in the end you think that the argument(s) in favor of your view outweigh the objections that can be raised against it.

What I am asking you to do in this paper is to use the skills you developed on the first two papers within the form of a more conventional essay. In doing so, don't lose your focus on the argumentative task – as explained in (i)-(v) – at hand.
