

Rare Classic Cars at Snite through November

Exhibition includes 1923 Studebaker Big Six Speedster

Forget the pastels and oil paints, marble figures and bronze statues. These award-winning works of art boast chrome and leather—and are ready to roll.

Four classic automobiles from the Jack Boyd Smith Jr. collection are on display at the Snite Museum of Art through November. The rare cars—a 1923 Studebaker, 1931 Cadillac, 1932 Auburn and 1932 Packard—were designed and built in the Midwest and are still drivable today.

"We think the cars will draw a different audience for us," says **Chuck Loving,** director of the museum. The Snite typically attracts students, elementary through college-age, as well as a number of Notre Dame visitors. This exhibit, however, will likely attract "dads and sons," according to Loving. A series of campus events—a film, jazz concert, fashion show and lectures—are planned to spur conversation on the time period.

Getting the cars placed inside the museum required special care and planning. The vehicles were pushed through the Snite's large east doors, the same ones used to deliver marble and other materials to Ivan Meštrović, the Croatian sculptor who worked and taught at the University from 1955 until his death in 1962. Once safely inside, the cars were guided through the wide opening where a wall once stood in Meštrović Studio Gallery.

Three cars are displayed in the gallery; the other is parked in the museum lobby.

The owner of the cars, Jack Boyd Smith Jr., is president and owner of Gaska Tape Inc., a specialty foam and tape products manufacturer in Elkhart. He is a member of the DeBartolo Center for the Performing Arts Advisory Council. He and his wife, Laura D. Arauz Smith, are benefactors of a performing arts endowment and the Summer Shakespeare program, where Mrs. Smith serves on the advisory board. The two have also supported a fellowship and library collection in the Mendoza College of Business, and funded teaching laboratories in Jordan Hall of Science.

Smith began collecting the automobiles last year, and has quickly acquired more than two dozen, which he houses in two climate-controlled buildings. He says his taste runs toward classic cars with low production numbers. He lists Packards, Auburns, Cadillacs and Studebakers among his prize-winning rides. "I didn't find the cars," he says. "They found me." The cars, though museum quality, do not collect dust. The affable Smith frequently selects one randomly to drive to lunch with his staff.

His '38 Cadillac, one of only 53 made, belonged to a politician. Smith's 1905 Cadillac, outfitted with wick candlelight headlamps, is one of the first 8,000 cars produced in the United States. Actor James Cagney was a previous owner of the '34 Auburn Salon Cabriolet, with its unique rear-mounted spare tire. Eric and Vivian LaVine, owners of LaVine Restorations of Nappanee, meticulously restored the vehicles and are custodians of the collection.

ROARING TWENTIES EXUBER-ANCE AND DEPRESSION-ERA EXTRAVAGANCE:

Selections from the Jack Boyd Smith Jr. Automobile Collection

Four classic automobiles will be on display at the Snite Museum of Art from Sunday, Aug. 17, through Sunday, Nov. 30, in the Meštrović Studio Gallery.

The autos on exhibit (manufactured in the American heartland: Detroit, South Bend and Auburn, Indiana) include an award-winning 1932 Auburn boattail Speedster—named for the speed records it earned as well as the "boattail" streaming; the 1932 Packard Light Eight, with a rumble seat and a special compartment for carrying golf clubs; a 1931 Cadillac dual cowl Phaeton—with passenger seating separate from the driver's cockpit; and a 1923 Studebaker Big Six Speedster, Studebaker's flagship model during its nine-year run. The car drew its name from the 353-cubic-inch inline six-cylinder power plant that produced—in 1923—65 horsepower.

The public is invited to a free exhibition reception from 2 to 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 14. Eric and Vivian LaVine, co-owners of LaVine Restorations, will speak at the reception about classic car restoration. 
