




S.S. Minnesota of the Guion Line: an Irish immigrant-laden ship, departed from Cobh, Co. Cork

Sprung from working class immigrants who worked hard and achieved success in America.


Ask your parents and grandparents what that means.

GREAT-GREAT GRANDFATHER: JOHN POWERS (1824-1865)

Born, County Waterford, Ireland

Emigrated to build the Illinois Central Railroad

Early citizen of Wapella, Illinois


Likely heard Lincoln in 1858, during Lincoln's stop in Wapella

Naturalized citizen 8 Oct 1860 by Judge David Davis, appointed by Lincoln as Justice of the US Supreme Court

Eligible to vote for president on 6 Nov 1860

any body else. The history of the Powers family shows what can be done by perseverance and industry. Twenty years ago the father of the family was an engine wiper in the round-house at Wapella and earned but small wages. He saved every dollar of his earnings, bought a home, and educated his children. When Powers died the mother took up the work of supporting her children, and little by little the family added to their small stock of wealth till now they own a couple of good farms and are in comfortable circumstances.

GREAT-GREAT GRANDFATHER: PATRICK TOOHILL (1840-1926)

Born, Fermoy County Cork, Ireland

Immigrated to New York City then Illinois

Befriended A. Lincoln and became "sodbuster"

Moved to Wapella, Illinois, 1862


Registered for the draft 1863


His father received a pass from A. Lincoln to search for his missing sons

He gave his grandchildren \$100 in gold on their graduation from college. No member of the farming community of DeWitt County is more worthy of representation in this Biographical Album than this gentleman. He is one of the most extensive farmers and stock-growers of Wilson Township, where he has large landed interests and a commodious home.....His father, Edmond Toohill, was also a native of that island, where he engaged as a farmer until he immigrated to America in 1838. After coming to this country he lived in the State of New York until 1857, when he took up his residence in this county. He had three sons in the army during the war, and he went to Washington to gain permission from Abraham Lincoln to see them. The President kindly gave him a pass that allowed him to go where he pleased, and he traveled much in the South and considerably through the West.










Volunteered in 1862 for the 88th New York



Radicalised by the Famine, his funeral became a propaganda coup for the movement


