Visual content

· Self-paced learning

A screencast can be watched in its entirety without a break, paused or repeated. The choice is the learner's. They can view it whenever and, in the case of mobile devices, wherever they wish.

Accessibility

The audiovisual nature of screencasts lends itself to enhanced accessibility. Captions or subtitles can assist those with aural impairment and audio description can be added for those with visual impairment. Subtitles can transform the screencast into a multilingual resource.

Unlike text documents, which can be very time consuming to prepare and proof, screencasts can be quickly recorded and delivered, particularly because of their...

Technical simplicity

Learning to create screencasts is a very quick and straightforward process. In a matter of minutes a novice can be creating useful resources. The use of templates can make this even simpler.

Addressing different learning modalities

Screencasting makes use of a combination of visual and auditory modalities, providing more than one channel for the learner to grasp complex information. For example, for those learners that struggle with literacy, the visual and auditory channels of a screencast provide a better method for understanding than text.
